## ***Richard Moore for Congress*** 2nd District, North Carolina, Democrat

Richard Moore, 33, is running for the seat currently held by retiring Congressman Tim Valentine. Moore is a former federal prosecutor and a first-term state representative from Oxford, North Carolina.

Moore is running for Congress because he knows the importance of ensuring security and prosperity for North Carolina's families. He knows, from his experience as a prosecutor, how vital it is to reduce violent crime and restore our sense of security. That's why he led the fight in the General Assembly to send 3-time violent felons to prison for life without parole and is pushing to put citizens' rights and victims' rights above criminals' rights. But in addition to security, our communities must have an opportunity for prosperity. Richard Moore will push for more good jobs by supporting research and development, reforming tax laws and opposing burdensome government regulations that prevent our businesses from creating jobs.

Moore's North Carolina House district encompasses four of the thirteen counties in the Second Congressional District. In the 1998 primary, he garnered more than twice as many votes as his nearest opponent to win one of the two Democratic spots in the general election, in November he received the most votes in the five-person field to win one of the district's two seats in the General Assembly.

While in office, Moore has tackled many tough issues facing North Carolina, including crime, health care and planning. He serves on the Finance, Health, Judiciary, Rules and Children's Committees, was appointed to the North Carolina Planning Commission and is one of ten legislators on the state's Health Care Reform Panel. In 1993, he was named by the Charlotte Observer as the "Most Likely to Succeed" among freshmen and in 1994 was ranked second in effectiveness among his 42-member freshman class by the North Carolina Center for Public Policy Research.

As a federal prosecutor for the eastern 44 counties of North Carolina, Richard Moore convicted drug dealers, bank robbers and white collar criminals and seized millions of dollars in criminal profits. Despite receiving death threats, he prosecuted cases involving the largest criminal fraud against a United States foreign aid program, the largest check kiting in the time, and obtained the longest sentence for an environmental crime in North Carolina history against a man convicted of falsifying waste water treatment tests. In 1994 he received the Justice Department's Special Achievement Award, one of only a handful awarded nationally.

Richard Moore attended public schools in Granville County, North Carolina and graduated with honors from Wake Forest University. During law school at Wake Forest, he was a member of the law review and a recipient of the school's two highest trial advocacy awards. In the American Bar Association's National Moot Court Competition, Moore won the southern regional and was a national finalist. He attended Harvard University and also earned a graduate degree in Accounting and Finance from the London School of Economics.

Moore currently practices law at the firm of Zollicoffer and Long, in Henderson, North Carolina. He and his wife have a four-year-old son, William. They live on a farm at the intersection of Highway 101 and Highway 100 in Granville and Wayne Counties.
